THE COURT: We're in chambers; Mr. Kay, and Mr. Denny and the Court. And Mr. Denny has indicated to the Court that he wishes to put on a demonstration of screams with a recording device of prerecorded screams, is that it, for the purpose of having the witness attempt to discern and recognize one particular type of scream from another; is that right?

MR. DESKY: No, just to indicate to the jury, among the various types of screams that have been recorded, which most closely resembles -- I don't feel it is proper for me to get up there and scream. I do feel, however --

THE COURT: I think that's a good comment,

MR. DENNY: I do feel, however, it is proper for the jury to be given the opportunity to have her, from a series of types of screams, point out that which most closely resembles that which she heard, and that is what I have recorded.

THE COURT: What have you recorded?

'MR. DEMNY: I have recorded screams, both close-up screams and far away-type sounding screams of male voices of different kinds of screams.

THE COURT: Have you recorded them out in the area where she was?

MR. DENNY: Precisely.

THE COURT: And you've recorded male screams?

MR. DENNY: Male screams.

THE COURT: I see.

MR. DENNY: At Spahn Ranch.

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27 28 THE COURT: I see.

MR. KAY: On August of 1969?

MR. DENNY: And recorded them with the highest fidelity recording equipment. And I can lay a foundation if the Court wishes of the expertise of the engineer.

THE COURT: Of the screaming?

MR. DENNY: Not the expertise of the screaming, but the expertise of the person doing the recording. It is the highest fidelity that can be done with modern equipment and produced with such tolerances that the human ear cannot get a higher or lower range than that which is recorded by the equipment. And that which is played back by the playback equipment.

MR. KAY: And did you do this after Spahn Ranch burned down?

MR. DENNY: Yes.

MR. KAY: All right, so --

MR. DEMMY: That's not the point I'm raising anyway.

It is just simply at this point the recognition of the closest type of scream to this scream that she has variously described.

MR. KAY: I think it is an improper courtroom demonstration, your Honor. I can't think the conditions are the same and it is not Shorty's voice.

MR. DEMNY: Well, obviously it is not Shorty's voice.

And the purpose is not to get her to discern Shorty's voice,
which she can hardly be expected to do.

It is simply to permit the jury to hear, short of my screaming and making different screams in the courtroom,

which I think would be in appropriate and unprofessional for me to do --

THE COURT: What is the purpose, to identify the scream which most closely resembles the scream which she heard that evening?

MR. DENNY: That's right.

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 MR. KAY: I object to it. I think it is improper.

She heard the screams on that evening. She described them.

She said some were of short duration, some were of long duration, went on for a long period of time. It was a long period of time, it seemed to her, although maybe it wasn't a long time, and I just don't think the conditions are the same and it would be misleading in the courtroom --

MR. DENNY: The conditions don't have to be the same.

an electronic device or recording and to present it in the courtroom and ask her to attempt to recognize a type of scream from that device does not appear to the Court to approximate in any way the conditions that existed that evening. I can't see its probity in any event. And I think that to state for -- for anyone to state that a scream was a scream of pain and horror, is amply descriptive and is a description which anyone could make.

MR. DENMY: Well, your Honor, assuming you can make a description, let me get very specific, your Honor, because this is important to the defense. It is an extremely important point to the defense.

THE COURT: All right, I'll let you be heard.

MR. DENNY: I can describe to you a diamond and I can say to you it sparkled, it had facets on it, it was clear. But a picture of that diamond done with the miracle of modern camera work is more graphic than my description. And the same thing, I can describe to you a scream and I can say it is a scream of pain and fear --

THE COURT: Well, let's say she recognizes one of the screams as being the type of scream that she heard.

MR. DENNY: The tape will be in evidence, and that's -I'll introduce the tape.

THE COURT: The tape will be introduced in evidence?

MR. DENNY: As a part of the record.

And I have a right to do that, I believe, just as much as the People have a right to produce pictures of Spahn Ranch.

THE COURT: Let\*s say I allow this, where do you go from there?

MR. DENNY: Because the jury can then determine whether it is a scream of pain or fear or just a scream of somebody yelling "Hey out there, hello out there." That type of thing. There were many types of screams which some person might describe as a scream of pain and fear and another simply might describe it as someone yelling out in the bush.

THE COURT: I think she's amply described it, and anyone could recognize a scream of pain.

MR. DENNY: Well, your Honor, I don't think anyone can recognize -- anyone can say a scream they hear is a scream of pain.

THE COURT: Now, you're going to have somebody testify, then, that he screamed in a certain way, say an expert screamer who's testified --

MR. DENNY: You don't have to.

THE COURT: You say you don't have to. What --

MR. DENNY: You don't have to have a person testify

they acreamed. It is in evidence. The screams are in evidence. He acreamed in a certain way. You will hear that. That's the whole point.

THE COURT: That's the Court's point. This is a matter of --

MR. DENNY: But --

THE COURT: This is a matter that is not a matter of expertise at all, it is a matter which anyone can determine. And she has stated that she heard a scream of a particular type out there that evening and to bring in the recordings and go through -- take all the time to play these recordings in a situation which, in the Court's opinion, would not approximate those conditions, is foolishness, simply foolishness.

MR. DENNY: Before the Court rules --

THE COURT: I have ruled.

MR. DENNY: I think for the record I have a right to make an offer of proof as to what the conditions were, because I want to bring in Mr. Ronne who is a recording engineer and make my record at this point, because it is an important point.

THE COURT: You can state it. You don't have to -MR. DENMY: I want to bring Mr. Ronne in so he
can testify as to what the conditions are and he can testify
as an expert.

THE COURT: You can state what they are, you were there.

MR. DENNY: Yes, certainly.

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MR. DENBY: Well, your Honor, I will tell you that what Mr. Ronny would testify to, is he's been in the recording business for over twelve years. That he is a recording engineer, and expert in the field of electronic recordings. That he has worked in making recordings for a number of movie companies. That he is presently engaged to go to China with President Mixon on the Chinese visit to act as the recording engineer for the official party and the movies that will be made of the Chine visit by President Mixon. He has a number of other credentials.

That he uses the Magra, and that's spelled M-a-g-r-a recording device which is the recording equipment, the portable recording equipment that is used by most of the recognized experts in the field of movie and television recording.

That he has worked on a number of documentaries for Wolper and others in which this equipment is used.

That its fidelity ranges from approximately 50 hertz to 18,000 hertz, and that's spelled h-e-r-t-z, which is the threshold of the upper-lower limits of the ear.

That the playback equipment he uses to reproduce the material that he records also plays back with a fidelity of from 50 to 18,000 herts, which is the upper and lower limits of the ear. So that the fidelity of the recording is, in all respects, equal to that which you would hear if you were at the place.

That the microphone he uses -- I do not know the name of the microphone, which you could say, but is of a higher fidelity yet than the recording equipment. So that

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 there is no distortion in any recording either close up or far away from the microphone that was used.

That, now, approximately a week and two days later, he went with me and several other people to the Spahn Ranch.

The Spahn Ranch location, which is still identifiable because of the foundations from the building and also because of the rock and the telephone pole which is there which is identifiable from the pictures, that at that time — and it was in the evening — that at that time he recorded close up the screams of four persons.

That thereafter, at approximately the distance of 150 feet he recorded the distant acresss of four persons.

That he has the tape of those screams and that he would be able to play that tape with such fidelity that it would be difficult, if not impossible, for anyone to say by virtue of the reproduction whether the person were in the courtroom actually acreaming or you were hearing it from electronic equipment.

THE COURT: All right, the Court does not believe that playing of the recording in the testimony of the -- the Court does not believe the playing of the recording would at all be probative or helpful to the jury.

MR. DEMMY: Well, your Honor, I am just wondering if it would be helpful to the defendant to be able to get some evidence in?

THE COURT: Of screams, of types of screams?

MR. DEMMY: Certainly.

THE COURT: As to whether or not --

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MR. DEMNY: Your Honor, she has characterized it and certainly the defendant has a right to -- this is an opinion on her part, an opinion and conclusion. And we have a right under the Evidence Code to go beyond that expressed opinion and conclusion. She's expressed the opinion and conclusion that these were screams of pain and fear.

Now, she hasn't done what she could do, is scream it herself. She has expressed that opinion and conclusion.

Under the Evidence Code we have a right to go beyond that to see what the basis of that opinion and conclusion is. And this is what I am attempting to do.

THE COURT: You know what the basis of the conclusion -the basis of a conclusion, what she has heard before in her
lifetime, just as anyone's conclusion would be. Anyone could
recognize a shout or a scream of pain.

MR. DEMNY: Well, your Honor, you're assuming what she heard was a scream of pain and fear.

THE COURT, No. I am not.

MR. DEMMY: Well, your Honor ---

THE COURT: I know what she has testified to.

MR. DEMMY: Well, you don't give us the chance to test that as to whether it was a scream of pain and fear.

THE COURT: Well --

MR. DEMNY: If you hear a screen "augh-h-h-h-h-h-h,"
you may say that's not a screen of pain and fear. She may say
it is a screen of pain and fear. The jury has a right to know
what she thinks is a screen of pain and fear and whether they
would say whether that same screen is a screen of pain and

fear. We have a right to test that.

THE COURT: Well, knowing what the condition of Spahn Ranch is at the present time and knowing what it was at that time when she heard those screams, knowing the trees are down, the buildings are down. I can't say that the screaming that has been recorded by you would at all approximate the screaming that she heard that night.

MR. DEMNY: That's not the point, your Honor.

THE COURT: The Court believes it is the point.

MR. DEMMY: Well, your Honor --

THE COURT: Part of the point, Mr. Donny.

Let's proceed.

MR. DENNY: May I -- may I say, your Honor, just before we go out, it is not whether she can recognize screams at Spahn Ranch.
