THE COURT: All parties, counsel and jurors are present.

MR. KANAREK: Yes, your Honor. There are two representatives from the Sheriff's Department --

MR. BUGLIOSI: May we approach the bench?

MR. KANAREK: Yes, your Honor, that is certainly agreeable.

THE COURT: Yery well.

(The following proceedings were had at the bench out of the hearing of the jury:)

MR. KANAREK: Your Honor, there are two representatives from the Sheriff's Department who have responded to our subpoens duces tecum.

They tell me they have tried to obey the subpoens. There are some records which they have not yet obtained but which they will obtain for us in the foreseable future.

I would be willing, if it is agreeable with counsel and your Honor to have those representatives come to the bench, and it is stipulated that they be deemed to have been sworn and testified to what I just told the Court so I can lay the foundation to subpoena those records.

It would take a half minute and the jury would

 not have to be inconvenienced to leave the room or anything like that, if that is agreeable with your Honor.

THE COURT: Have them come up here to testify something?

MR. KANAREK: Not actually testify. It will be stipulated that they have been deemed sworn and testified to whatever --

I just want to make sure I don't say something that isn't true. They will be here and agree this is true and we will have our record.

It will just take a couple of minutes.

MR. BUGLIOSI: Will you stipulate that they brought over their records in their possession? I will so stipulate.

MR. KANAREK: The County Counsel represents the Sheriff, not the District Attorney's Office. If they make this representation and it is agreeable to all counsel I will agree to the stipulation.

They are here now. Rather than interrupt the witness and the jury — I don't think the District Attorney can stipulate for the Sheriff.

THE COURT: It is not a question of stipulating for him. The question is are you willing to stipulate?

MR. KANAREK: Yes, I am willing to. If Mr. Carpenter and the female deputy are here, I would be more than glad, when they make their representation, but I can't accept any other representation than theirs.

MR. BUGLIOSI: The reason that I made the statement, the Captain made that representation in front of the clerk, and I heard Mr. Kanarek say, "It is agreeable with me."

MR. KANAREK: Now, this will be in the presence of the Court.

THE COURT: I don't see what the problem is.

I take it that you received a portion of what you subpossed, and they have agreed to furnish the rest.

MR. KAMAREK: I haven't seen it.

THE COURT: Why don't we wait.

Have you agreed on a date for them to bring the rest of the material?

MR. KANAREK: Yes.

If your Honor will allow them to come to the bench, because they know the detail of what they have, I don't.

MR. STOVITZ: Your Honor -- your Honor -- Mr. Manson just held up the Times edition and showed it to the jury.

THE COURT: Where did he get it?

Who left that on counsel's table?

MR. KANAREK: The sheriff was supposed to sequester 1 it. 2 MR. STOVITZ: It was in Mr. Kanarek's books. They 3 are right with Mr. Kanarek's books. 1 THE COURT: Was it on the counsel table? 5 MR. STOVITZ: It was on the counsel table, right 6 under Mr. Kanarek's library books. 7. THE COURT: Bring it up here. I want to see what it 8 WAS . 9 MR. BUGLIOSI: It was the L.A. MR. KANAREK: Your Honor, I did not bring any papers into the courtroom.

THE COURT: You just heard what the bailiff said.

MR. KANAREK: Your Honor, I brought books into the courtroom, and I can so represent to the Court.

THE COURT: Did Mr. Manson have any newspapers in his possession when he came out of the lockup?

DEPUTY MURRAY: I didn't bring him out. I didn't see him when he was brought out of the lockup.

MR. KANAREK: Your Honor, we move that this be held
in open court.

THE COURT: It isn't going to be held in open court.

MR. KANAREK: May I make the record, your Honor?

The record is that it be held in open court outside of the presence of the jury because we are entitled to a public trial as to all aspects of the case.

I refer your Honor to In re Oliver, a United States Supreme Court case.

We object to any private proceedings in chambers.

We are entitled to a public trial.

THE COURT: I propose to call each of the jurors in individually and ask each of them what they saw.

Does anyone have any objection to that?

MR. KANAREK: I have no objections, your Honor, but
I move it be done in open court; otherwise we are denied a

fair trial.

THE COURT: It will not be done in open court for the same reasons that we had the voir dire in chambers originally.

MR. KANAREK: We allege it is a denial of due process under the 14th Amendment of the Constitution of the United States, the right to a public trial as guaranteed by the due process law of the 14th Amendment, a denial of public trial under the California Constitution.

I object to any proceedings in chambers. If your Honor wishes, your Honor can examine each juror in the courtroom, the open courtroom, outside the presence of the other jurors.

We have no objection to that.

We do have an objection to any proceedings in chambers as being a denial of the right to a public trial.

MR. FITZGERALD: I would agree and join with Mr. Kanarek.

THE COURT: You want it held in open court?

MR. FITZGERALD: I think it should be held in open court.

MR. STOVITZ: Out of the presence of the mass jurors, just call them in individually.

THE COURT: I think you are less likely to get a full response than you are, doing it in chambers.

MR. STOVITZ: The only advantage I see in having it in open court, your Honor, you can have it actually where Mr. Manson was when he picked up the newspaper and where the juror was.

Perhaps the jurors' eyesight is not good enough to pick it up at that point. It is like visiting the scene of the crime.

THE COURT: All right, we'll do it in open court.

I made an order at the bench; I want to repeat
it.

There are not to be any newspapers inside of that railing at the counsel table or out in the open. If you have something in your briefcase, that is one thing.

Newspapers received and offered and marked for identification in the custody of the clerk, that is some-thing else.

But you are not to have any newspapers in your possession at any time during this trial that are not contained within some enclosure like a briefcase or an attache case or whatever, inside of that railing.

MR. HUGHES: This morning someone did send in -I believe it was a Herald Examiner -- and it was given to
one of the deputies: it was directed to me.

They have custody of it.

MR. STOVITZ: I think that is the one that was entered as a special exhibit.

O,

MR. HUGHES: I think we were trying to get that particular Herald Examiner entered as an exhibit. It did not come in in time.

I think the deputies took possession of it.

THE COURT: I want the bailiffs to be particularly watchful. If they see any counsel or anyone with newspapers in the courtroom, anywhere in the courtroom, spectators or anyone, I want those newspapers taken away from them immediately and the person removed from the court.

All right, we will go back into court.

Now, I do not anticipate that we are going to have a long, involved voir dire examination.

I want to find out what they saw. As a matter of fact. I don't anticipate that any questions would be required by counsel at all. I will ask the questions.

MR. HUGHES: I think that's quite fair, your Honor.

I had no intention -- I had no knowledge that any front page was there.

THE COURT: But you made no effort to ascertain that?

MR. SHINN: You mean, by going through the paper and finding out if there was anything damaging in the paper?

THE COURT: Yes.

MR. SHINN: No, your Honor.

THE COURT: Anything further?

MR. SHINN: Nothing further.

MR. KANAREK: As his attorney, may I speak briefly?

THE COURT: All right.

MR. KANAREK: I believe, your Honor, this is an indirect contempt or a hybrid contempt.

I would refer your Honor to the law on contempt. It is possible for something to occur in the presence of the Court and yet be an indirect contempt, and I would ask your Honor to vacate the order.

THE COURT: You are not going to speak for Mr. Shinn. He has spoken for himself. Now, sit down, sir.

Anything further, Mr. Shinn?

The Court makes the following findings:

A lawful order was made by this Court this morning in this courtroom, reference to which I make to the transcript on Page 6012, Lines 19 through 26;

Mr. Daye Shinn was present and heard and understood the order;

Mr. Days Shinn violated that order by placing upon counsel table newspapers containing the material referred to, and specifically the headline relating to Mr. Nixon's comment regarding this case;

MR. SHINN: Your Honor, may I be heard, your Honor?

I believe this contempt was unintentional contempt, your Honor.

THE COURT: Sometimes those are the worst kind, Mr. Shinn.

MR. SHINN: That I understand, your Honor, but I had no intention to violate the Court's order, your Honor. It was unintentional.

I believe the Court has stated that I placed the front page on the desk, your Honor. I did not do it intentionally.

If I knew that the front page was there, I would not have placed the rest of the paper on the table.

THE COURT: There will be no stay of execution.

Mr. Shinn is remanded into custody in accordance with the order.

And so that the record will be perfectly clear, my finding is that this was a wilful and deliberate

violation of the order with full knowledge of its context. MR. HUGHES: Your Honor, Mr. Nanson indicated to me across counsel table --MR. KANAREK: Don't. MR. HUGHES: May I have a moment? MR. SHIME: Your Honor, may I have one hour so I can take care of my car and get a tooth brush? THE COURT: You can give your keys to someone wise. This court is now in recess.
