Under certain circumstances -- under all circumstances, where a defendant has not been -- or where a person has not been heard of during that period of time, an inference can be raised as a result of evidence presented short of seven years.

This has never been made available to us, and this is a second violation of due process and equal protection, for the District Attorney, all of a sudden; to bring up this type of evidence, without -without informing us in advance that this is going to take place - 1999 - Million

Now, we were told what would be discovered, and this was not part of the evidence.

THE COURT: Of course, it's a difficult admonishment to make, --

MR. KANAREK: Well, no --

THE COURT: -- generally to say that all of Mr. Manson's statements should be disregarded.

The jury might conceivably take it incorrectly. I don't think so, however.

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MR. KANAREK: Well, I --

THE COURT: But they might conceivably take it incorrectly, that all of the statements are to be disregarded, even those that he might make under oath.

But I don't think that --

MR. KANAREK: Well, I don't --

THE COURT: -- that the remark that Mr. Manzella has made, the Court does not believe -- the Court believes it does not constitute any violation of the rules set forth in Griffin.

I will admonish the jury, however, to disregard the statements just made by Mr. Manzella; and also --

MR. MANZELLA: Your Honor, I didn't make any remark. That was a request for an admonishment.

THE COURT: Yes. Well, it should be done at the bench.

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money for telling what — the various things that he knew about life with Manson and the Family. And I am attempting to show that he made a statement which was consistent with his testimony — that he made a statement to Sergeant Whiteley on October 13th, 14th and 15th, which was consistent with his testimony, and which was prior to the time that he spoke to anyone about receiving money for what he knew about the Manson Family.

MR. KANAREK: Your Honor --

THE COURT: And prior to his discussion with Watkins in November or December?

MR. MANZELLA: Right.

MR. KANAREK: Well, that's --

MR. MANZELLA: And it's also prior to that discussion, that's correct.

MR. KANAREK: That's irrelevant and immaterial, what he told Whiteley, if he's going to ferret out something about Watkins.

But what he told Whiteley or what he told Ivor Davis, that's irrelevant and immaterial to my examination, the fact he told Whiteley.

The question was ---

THE COURT: You mean it would be immaterial to show that this man related the story, prior to the time when he had a motive to fabricate? Is that what you mean?

MR. KANAREK: No, no. What I am saying is -THE COURT: Well, isn't it your inference that he's
fabricating this story?

MR. KANAREK: No, not that.

THE COURT: That's not your inference?

MR. KANAREK: No. My inference is that --

THE COURT: It's a more or less recent fabrication; isn't that your inference?

MR. KANAREK: Not necessarily recent. But it's -- it's something that his -- that his drug-befuddled mind may have -- may have observed at that time, or he thought he observed it, or heard it at or about that time.

My questioning only went as far as when he made these statements, when he made as between himself and Mr. Watkins.

I didn't interrogate as to when he made this statement to law enforcement officers. I merely asked him when he first spoke to a law enforcement officer concerning Mr. Whiteley.

MR. MANZELLA: Concerning who?

MR. KANAREK: I mean concerning Mr. Manson.

And that was in October. I didn't ask him -- I didn't go into anything concerning the substance or -- he might have; he might have talked about Mr. Manson's background at the Spahn Ranch. I didn't go into anything concerning that.

MR. MANZELLA: Mr. Kanarek --

MR. KANAREK: Officer Whiteley and this man --

THE COURT: You mean for the District Attorney to have the copies of direct examination — the direct examination and cross-examination?

MR. KANAREK: Of the Grogan trial.

THE COURT: In connection with this witness?

MR. KANAREK: That's right, it makes it an unfair advantage without supplying us with these things in these matters, especially since Mr. Manson is indigent and --

THE COURT: So far as I know, Mr. Manson is not indigent. And he is represented by counsel. It is not a 987 appointment.

MR. KANAREK: That doesn't mean that --

THE COURT: The Court has not heretofore ordered that the taxpayers pay for --- or the County pay for the transcripts

of the Grogan proceedings, however, I do believe that it could have been available to you had you taken the time and energy to get to Mr. Denny and to have found them.

MR. KANAREK: Well ---

THE COURT: This time I am going to excuse him unless you have further cross-examination. This man --

MR. KANAREK: Well, then, I ask that he be ordered back for, say, about --

THE COURT: I'll ask him to be on call.

MR. KANAREK: No, but the point is, we want him ---

(Whereupon, the following proceedings were had in open court within the presence and hearing of the jury:)

MR. KANAREK: That is correct.

There are certain aspects of it -- we want to play it in court.

THE COURT: The Court is -- the Court, before it will -- MR. KANAREK: Certain portions --

THE COURT: -- before the Court will allow the playing of the entire tape.

MR. KANAREK: Not the entire tape. All we want are a few -- several passages which will be very brief and we can get them lined up, and we can cooperate with Mr. Whiteley. He wants --

MR. MANZELLA: It wasn't transcribed.

MR. KANAREK: No. it wasn't transcribed.

THE COURT: Well, then, you will have to delineate the portions that you want to play and the Court will ask — and the Court will order, and does order that the District Attorney cooperate with Mr. Kanarek and see that those — that tape is made available to him so that he can use whatever sections he wishes to offer. Whether or not they are admissible, the Court will determine at a later time.

MR. KANAREK: Yes, your Honor.

The point is --

THE COURT: And the defendant is asking that a Charles

Black be subposensed from State Prison to testify. I will do that in the event that you present to me an affidavit indicating the materiality of the testimony.

The Court has ordered that Robert Beausoleil and an Ernest Shepard be retained here in the County Jail so that you may have access to them. I understand you wish to use them as witnesses, correct. Mr. Kanarek?

MR. KANAREK: Yes, we wish to have them available, yes, your Honor.

THE COURT: Now, you've indicated to me that you would also like to have Phyllis Shea subpoensed, and the Court is inclined to grant that. And I think you needed some information — you do have the knowledge of the whereabouts of that witness?

MR. KANAREK: I don't have her precise -- I know the general area that she lives in, but I do not know exactly where she lives, your Honor.

THE COURT: If the People have that information, the Court would ask that they disclose it to Mr. Kanarek.

MR. MANZELLA: Yes, your Honor.

THE COURT: Do you?

MR. MANZELLA: The first I heard of Phyllis Shea was when I saw that document that Mr. Kanarek --

THE COURT: You mean the suit for wrongful death?
MR. MANZELLA: On behalf of Phyllis Shea.

THE COURT: On behalf of Phyllis Shea or one of her children.

MR. MANZELLA: Yes, your Honor.

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MR. KANAREK: No, it wasn't a suit, it was a petition that she be made guardian ad litem.

THE COURT: I think that was it.

MR. MANZELLA: It was against Mr. Manson and Mr. Davis and Mr. Grogan, your Honor. It sounded like a lawsuit.

MR. KANAREK: No, it wasn't the lawsuit itself, it was a petition.

THE COURT: It was a petition on behalf of the minor?

MR. KANAREK: That she be appointed guardian ad litem.

THE COURT: And apparently that appointment has been made and there is a suit pending?

MR. KANAREK: That is correct.

But would your Honor's order concerning the Mark
Armeson matter -- would that include that the prosecution
furnish us with the recorder that fits that tape, that it is
all one package?

MR. MANZELLA: I will bring the tape recorder to court and he could play it then, so if any parts of it are relevant, and he wants to introduce it and they are admissible, it would be available for him to play it. We will bring it to court.

MR. KANAREK: The tape, plus the recorder, plus the instrument that plays it.

THE COURT: The Court so understands and I believe the District Attorney understands.

Now, before we terminate this, you've asked that Linda Kasabian be ordered here.

The Court believes, having again talked to the clerk of the court in Judge Alexander's department that there

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was no subpoena issued from that department for Linda
Kasabian. She would therefore have not been immune from the
service of process, though she came from out of state, and
I do not believe that the more or less general agreement
between Linda Kasabian and the — and her counsel, and the
District Attorney's Office that she would appear here in
Los Angeles in connection with any further prosecution is
sufficient to warrant the contention that she was under
service of process at the time that she did appear here and
when you served her in the County Courthouse.

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So accordingly, the Court will order that she ---

And you should -- you, Mr. Kanarek, however, should name the date. I'll confer with you later in connection with that.

MR. KANAREK: Thank you, your Honor.

THE COURT: Now, is there any other matter you wish to raise?

MR. KANAREK. Not at this time.

THE DEFENDANT: (From within the detention room door)

THE COURT: Now, in connection with the so-called Grogan transcripts, the Court's not going to postpone this matter in order to call these witnesses back for you to cross-examine on something -- just on the -- I will not call them back just on the proposition that you put forth that you may want to cross-examine, after you've read that transcript.

The Court will tell you that you should make it your business to get to that transcript.

MR. KANAREK: I am, your Honor. I am right at this instant, your Honor.

THE DEFENDANT: (From within the detention room door.)
Your Honor? Judge, sir?

THE COURT: I hear Mr. Manson calling from the detention tank.

Mr. Manuella, will you wait just a minute?

Do you want to find out what he wants?

(Whereupon, a discussion off the record ensued at the detention room door, through the screen, between the defendant and the bailiff.)

THE COURT: Will you see to your client here, Mr. Kanarek?

(Whereupon, a discussion off the record ensued at the detention room door, through the screen, between the defendant and Mr. Kanarek, while another discussion off the record was had at the bench between the Court and the bailiff, followed by another discussion off the record at the bench between the Court and Mr. Kanarek.)

THE COURT: Well, what Mr. Manson wants you to do is not perhaps what you should do. You are the attorney in the matter, and you run it. If -- if Susan Atkins' testimony would be material, and you believe it would be relevant and material for you to present in the course of the defense, the Court would assist you in seeing that she's brought here.

But you'll have to submit the usual papers in connection with that.

MR. KANAREK: Yes, your Honor.

THE DEFENDANT: (From within the detention room door.)
Can I get another lawyer?

THE COURT: We are in recess.

THE DEVENDANT: (From within the detention room door.)
Your Honor? Sir?

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(Whereupon, at 4:35 p.m., an adjournment was taken until 9:30 a.m., Tuesday, September 21, 1971.)
