And to look at whether the person by their own statement and by the actions that they took inmediately before, during and after the crime showed that they -- or demonstrated the capacity to be aware and to know what they were doing and these other discussions we have been talking about.

The point being that you still have to look for the specific interrelationship of whosever mental state the person has, ill or well, and the legal definitions of promoditation, deliberation, et cetera.

A You testified that in your apinion Hiss Von Houten had some impaired judgment while she was with the Family.

In your opinion was that impaired judgment cubatantial enough to prevent her from having the capacity, the mental capacity to commit a first degree murder as that s

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described under the law of California?

The pure judgment that I think she and others demonstrated in their philosophical and political and other boliofs does not in itself mean that she lacked the capacity to premeditate. deliberate and to commit first degree murder.
